The campaign featured high school athletes from around the region who committed to saying no to the harmful effects of JUULing. PPHD wants to remind everyone to not let the ads from JUUL fool you - JUUL's flavored ecigarettes can deliver the same amount of nicotine as 20 cigarettes. Last year, teen e-cigarette use spiked to 78%. Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which is highly addictive and can harm brain development.

Some e-cigarettes look like regular tobacco products, such as cigarettes. But in recent years, e-cigarettes look like other things, including USB flash drives, pens, and other everyday items. JUUL is one of the most common e-cigarettes shaped like a USB flash drive. None of them are safe for young people to use.

Help us spread the awareness of the harmful effects of e-cigarette use by talking to students about the dangers today. We commend each of the area athletes that committed to being a leader and helped raise awareness of this increasing problem by steering clear of the harmful effects of JUULing.
